- Analysis of performance of each WILLIAM institution according to the composite indicators
- For assessment of current situation and strategy development, 3 thresholds apply:
 - ➤ Larger than 66%: Green and thus top tier (high level of Internationalisation)
 - > 34% and 66%: Yellow and thus medium tier (medium level of Internationalisation)
 - > Smaller than 34%: Red and thus lowest tier (low level of Internationalisation)
